Lesson 4 - God is Longsuffering

Exodus 34:5-6 Now the LORD descended in the cloud and stood with him (Moses) there, and proclaimed the name of the LORD. And the LORD passed before him and proclaimed, "The LORD, the LORD God, merciful and gracious, longsuffering, and abounding in goodness and truth...

This week we will look at the fourth characteristic the Lord proclaimed to Moses:

> Longsuffering

Begin this study with prayer, asking the Lord to reveal Himself in His word that you might know Him more.

The Meaning

In Exodus 34:6 we find two common translations for the Hebrew word *arek* are longsuffering and slow to anger. The New Testament word *makrothymia* is translated longsuffering and patient.

- 2. When we include a third translation for this word, slow to anger, we can see how all of these definitions and translations infer two things:
- there is an offense or provocation
- longsuffering describes the reaction or lack of reaction to that offense

Manifestation of His Name
We will look into both the Old Testament and the New Testament for examples of the longsuffering of God.

In the Old Testament we see the longsuffering of the Lord over and over again is in His dealings with the children of Israel. You will see this as you read Ezekiel 20:15-17.

- 3. Now read the rest of 2 Peter 3:9 and write the reason for God's longsuffering below.

Stop now and pray for the lost, that their eyes would be opened to the salvation of the Lord while His longsuffering holds back their judgment.

The Effect of Understanding God's Character

We have talked about the meaning of longsuffering but it is often by considering the opposite meaning that we can identify the evidence or the lack of it in our walk. Some words that describe the opposite of longsuffering are:

anger, impatience, intolerance, unforgiveness, revenge

Ask Him today to reveal any of the traits above in your own life, then repent, ask forgiveness and ask His Holy Spirit to help you walk in longsuffering toward others.
